Transparency (Returned Questionnaires) A measure of a candidates willingness to respond to a questionnaire that informs constituents regarding their position on important issues facing constituents. A failure to reply indicates resistance to transparency.	 No Reply -15 %
Public Advocacy in defense of our Rights and Freedoms Verifiable Positions taken by our representatives in the news, social media, press releases, etc. This is a cumulative measure of the verifiable public records and statements made that address critical issues.	 High 15 %

 Bill 36 - Health Professionals and Occupations Act 	 Voted Against
The Provincial Government can conduct warrantless searches of medical offices, dictate healthcare services and access private clinical records. Fine doctors \$200,000 or prison up to 6 months for noncompliance, forced mental health assessments for professionals.	
 Bill 44 - Housing Amendment Act 	 Voted Against
Encourages densification by transferring the authority for issuing building permits from the municipal to the provincial government and removes a homeowner's ability to contest decisions about neighbourhood densification. Developers can make changes remotely.	
 Bill 47 – (passed Nov 2024) 	 Voted Against
The provincial government can issue permits for high-rise apartments up to 20 stories near transportation hubs, overriding municipal planning. Without considering existing city infrastructure like parking and utilities.	
 Bill 19 – 2020 Covid-19 Related Measures Act 	 Voted For
Enforcement legislation regarding Lock Downs, restriction of movement and control contrary to the Canadian Bill of Rights and the Charter.	

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 Bill 37 – 2008 Carbon Tax Act 	POSITION
The Carbon Tax Act has contributed substantially to business costs. It also added financial strain to everyone's personal cost of living and is a deterrent to investment in the province.	 Voted For
 Motion 3 - (April 2022) 	 Voted Against
This motion voted to condemn the Canadian Truckers convoy and their inherent protected right to protest. It also supported discrimination through the Public Health orders that trampled the rights of British Columbians as a result of their personal health care choices.	
 Bill 31 - Emergency Management Act (Passed Nov 2023) 	 Voted Against
Allows the Minister to declare an Emergency without proof or substantial evidence and oversight. Takes away your rights to protect your property.	
 Bill 41 – Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act 	 Voted For
Authorizes the “return” of all BC lands and associated resources to indigenous bands for management, removing existing private ownership.
